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to feel comfortable posting and interacting in this group. But it gives us a window into our community.

Zoom! Zoom is a way to use the internet to see and talk with each other - much like the old telephone party lines, except with the video added. Most laptops have a camera and microphone, all smart phones do, desktop computers likely need the camera and mike added as an accessory. Zoom allows us to "gather", see each other and chat without any concern over the virus. Not as good as face-to-face, but safer for now. It also eliminates the need to travel anywhere to "get together"! Zoom does involve some technology. Caring for the Church

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Extended Missions

05/17/20 Golden Cross Sunday

Annual conferences in The United Methodist Church set aside one Sunday each year to observe Golden Cross Sunday. On this Sunday, a special offering is collected that will be used for health and welfare ministries in the annual conference.

Those in need of receiving assistance from this fund could be victims of natural or manmade disasters, they could be experiencing health problems, facing harsh and impossible economic circumstances or experiencing any of the many challenges that come with aging.

We take up these Golden Cross offerings as The United Methodist Church because we believe where there are persons in need, we as the church have a responsibility to respond with actions in the spirit of doing good, seeking justice, rescuing the oppressed, defending the orphan, and pleading on behalf of those who have no voice.

While the ways that annual conferences use these funds may vary, the purpose is clear: Golden Cross Sunday is an opportunity for the church to take action and love our most vulnerable neighbors.

One in six people in the United States faces hunger and even more people face food insecurity that directly affects their health and well-being. Our generous gifts toward Golden Cross Sunday help people and families begin to address real problems like hunger or lack of medical care that lead to poor health and welfare.

Hunger is a real issue in America, affecting our country's most vulnerable. In 2014, 46.7 million people were living in poverty, including 15.5 million children under the age of 18 and 4.6 million seniors ages 65 and older. As these difficult conditions continue, poverty and hunger need our attention.

The United Methodist Church, which believes in making disciples for the transformation of the world, also has several ways to get involved in working toward disrupting the cycles of poverty in our communities.

One of those is through Golden Cross Sunday, which is observed one Sunday each year on a date determined by each annual conference. On Golden Cross Sunday, The United Methodist Church takes up an offering that goes toward health and welfare ministries of the annual conference.

05/24/20 Heritage Sunday

Heritage Sunday is an annual observance for United Methodists to remember and reflect on their legacy. It is an ideal time for local churches and Annual Conference Commissions on Archives and History and Historical Societies to develop programs and projects reflecting the importance of history in congregational formation and casting the future.

According to The Book of Discipline 2016, "Heritage Sunday shall be observed on Aldersgate Day (May 24), or the Sunday preceding that date. The day provides an opportunity for reflection on heritage, celebration of where the Church has been, how it understands itself as it shapes us today, and the meaning of Christian conferencing. Heritage Sunday calls the Church to remember the past by committing itself to the continuing call of God (Paragraph 264.1).

History and historians sometimes get a bad rap, as if the subject and its devotees are only interested in the past and tediously preserving it. The General Commission on Archives and History staff believe and experience every day the power of history not merely as remembrance but active engagement, the past pointing to purpose, the DNA that makes us who we are, forming how we live-into the future. 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05/24/20 Aldersgate Sunday

Aldersgate Day is observed on May 24, 2020. The day is a holiday celebrated by Methodists to commemorate the day when John Wesley "experienced confirmation of his salvation by the grace of God" in a meeting room in Aldersgate Street, London back in 1738. The theologist and Anglican minister John Wesley is known as the father of Methodism, and evangelical movement from which Methodism religion emerged. In the United Kingdom this Remembrance Day is called Aldersgate Sunday, as it is annually observed on the Sunday preceding May 24. Aldersgate Sreet is a part of the A1 in London leading to Edinburgh.


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A Time of Prayer
